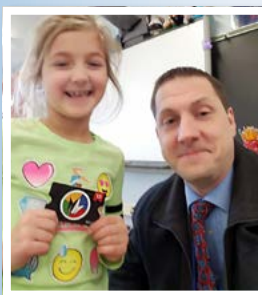

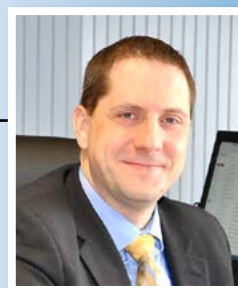

Girls Basketball Team Are Section VI Champs

Frontier's Girls Basketball team has had an incredible season, entering the Section VI Class AA postseason as the No. 1 seed. On February 26, the Falcons beat the Lancaster Legends in the quarter final game. On March 1, they moved on to face the Jamestown Red Raiders at Kenmore West in the semi-finals, coming out on top 37-20. Then, on March 6, the team brought home the Section VI Class AA championship, defeating Williamsville North. Notable team members were the dynamic duo of junior Claire Kruszka and senior Kennedy Izzo, who both reached the 1,000-point milestone this season. Kennedy also surpassed the school's points record.

Frontier Seventh-Grader Brings Home State Title

In her first trip to the New York State Public High Schools Athletic Association gymnastics championship, Frontier seventh-grader Lea Philarom won the all-around title. Lea scored 38.125 points, which included a tie for second in floor exercise (9.525), second place on balance beam (9.55) third on bars (9.550) and a vault score of 9.50.

Her score, along with her teammates, allowed Section VI to regain the championship from Section III (Syracuse) in Cold Spring Harbor on Long Island. This marks the fifth championship for Section VI in seven years as well as a points record of 187.905, 1.126 more than the previous record set by Section XI (Suffolk County) in 2003.

Alumni Spotlight

At Frontier Central School District, we know our Falcons have spread their wings following graduation to go on to make an impact in our community and beyond. In an effort to bring recognition to our deserving alumni, the district has begun the online Alumni Spotlight on our website, www.frontier.wnyric.org.

This spotlight features a Frontier alumnus who has demonstrated a personal or professional achievement or community impact. During the pilot of this feature, the district has put the spotlight on Lissa Marie Redmond and Gina Fava, two authors who published new works, Nicole Radon, a musician who performed at New York Fashion Week, and Ensign Bailey J. McGowan, MBA, a "hometown hero".

Ensign McGowan was nominated for the Alumni Spotlight by her mother, Kathleen McGowan after she was named a Hometown Hero by Country 106.5 WYRK. A 2008 Frontier High School graduate, Bailey furthered her education at the University at Buffalo and Canisius College.

She wanted a job that allowed her to travel – a lifelong dream – and becoming a U.S. Navy supply officer has allowed her to fulfill that dream. Her first deployment was to Osaka, Japan. But, prior to shipping out Ensign McGowan visited her alma mater to encourage current Falcons to follow their dreams and consider all options, whether that's the military or college.

"Frontier is a premiere school district and has been doing great work for a long time. We are proud of our alumni and know that they have gone on to make impressive accomplishments.
